

Afterwards they had to carry them all up the stairs onto the sidewalk. By 9:00 AM they were exhausted. As always, help arrived. Cindy already mentioned that if these two ladies can't come any more, she will quit, too – it's just way too much work to set up and then try to keep an eagle eye on people. Afterward they closed up "shop" and wrapped up everything and stored them away. A HUGE thank you goes to Cindy, Jackie, Kim and Steve!



CAT REPORT – SEPTEMBER 2014

Another quiet month for our cats, who've been enjoying the lovely fall weather, some on the porch and some on windowsills. Ashley's quiet and shy; Grover's dignified; and Ryan's a clown. When a gray cat lands on my back as I bend over to put down or pick up a dish, I don't have to look to know it's Ryan.
