You would think the dogs prefer to chew on rawhide bones then people bones, but even that is becoming very dangerous, according to the FDA- but dangerous to the dogs:

FDA warns pet owners against giving dogs bone treats

Pet owners may want to rethink rewarding their dogs with bones after the U.S. Food & Drug Administration released a warning of the risks of the much-coveted treat.

The FDA has received dozens of reports detailing pet illnesses -- and even deaths -- relating to "bone treats," it said on its website. Bone treats differ from uncooked butcher-type bones because they are processed and packaged for sale and are commercially available for dogs.

Among the descriptions for the bone treats listed in the reports are "Ham Bones," "Pork Femur Bones," "Rib Bones," and "Smokey Knuckle Bones," according to the FDA. The bones may be dried through a smoking process or by baking and can contain other ingredients such as preservatives, seasonings and smoke flavorings.

"Giving your dog a bone treat might lead to an unexpected trip to your veterinarian, a possible emergency surgery, or even death for your pet," said Carmela Stamper, a veterinarian at the FDA's Center for Veterinary Medicine.

Illnesses that were reported include choking, gastrointestinal obstruction, or blockage in the digestive track, cuts and wounds in the mouth or on the tonsils, vomiting, diarrhea, bleeding from the rectum and even death, according to the FDA. About 15 dogs died after eating the bone, the FDA reported.

The reports involved about 90 dogs and were sent in by pet owners and veterinarians, the FDA said.

There you have it. I guess the mushy food I have to feed my own dog is much safer. She has a condition called EPI, which means her pancreas is not working and she can't digest food. So I have to soak her food in enzymes (horrible smelling stuff) so that she does not starve to death. If you ever have a dog like this and need help, let me know, I am becoming an expert.☺ It seems that more and more dogs, cats and now even people have to deal with this illness. Is it an environmental thing or food, who knows?

In addition to the Thompsons playing Santa Claus, we also had a great surprise in the form of our first prize at last month's fundraiser being returned: The winner of the \$250, Grace Lenihan, gave it back to our Shelter! Thank you so much, Grace!

CAT REPORT – OCTOBER & NOVEMBER 2017

I've been weighing her every couple days; she's gained back more than a pound of the weight she lost while she was on strike. We never did find out what ailed her; the multitude of tests came up with no informative results.

Alafer has had one return to the vet, after he stopped eating for a couple days. The upper respiratory infection that flares up every now and then was bothering him; an antibiotic injection made an almost instant improvement, and he too is eating well and acting normal at the moment. His head still wobbles, not enough to keep him from eating, getting into and out of the litter box and jumping onto his favorite chair

Another good thing in October was that a nice couple came to meet Lucien and Feather, thinking they might adopt them. Lucien thought they were fine people; Feather, who's usually the bolder and more outgoing of the two, barely spoke to them and hid in a corner most of the time they were here. They want to come back for another visit, but our schedules haven't meshed. We'll see what happens.

In November our friends in Bangor and East Millinocket hosted the annual Fleabag Ball in Bangor, with guests bringing dog and cat food and supplies and Charley's Strays getting a generous share. The cats got a big assortment of food, litter, treats and toys, as they do every year. The ball is a memorial to a dog who crossed the Rainbow Bridge -- such a nice idea, and I'm delighted that Charley's Strays is on the list to get donations.
