## CAT REPORT MARCH 2020

In times like these I'm glad I have cats – totally oblivious to the craziness, and therefore very soothing. Although the morning I came downstairs to find the dining room temperature around 45 degrees because the cats had opened the doors onto the porch overnight, I was not soothed. Apparently I'd not fully latched the heavy wooden inside door, and once the cats pry that open several, especially grey and white Lucien (aka Loosey Goosey), are expert at batting the handle of the storm door until it opens. If Lucien was involved I suspect black and white brother Feather (aka Featherhip, because his white patch that looks like a feather is on his left hip) wasn't far behind, and on a guess most of the rest of the roomful enjoyed going in and out with them.

So far we're doing all right. I had time to stock up on cat food and have enough litter for a while; my favorite brand has been mostly unavailable, but I have some left plus two big bags of my fallback brand that the cats accept. I've not needed my veterinarians in two weeks (knock on wood), so this afternoon I called to check on them; everyone is well, and they're trying to be careful by doing curb service, carrying out supplies and asking clients to wait in their vehicles while their pets are inside.

Again, many thanks to the cats' friends for their ongoing support. I met a new donor (to cats and dogs both) during the normal first week of this month, though I didn't ask her name. As I was waiting to check out of Loyal Biscuit, a pet food store in Waterville, the young woman ahead of me stuffed some money into the Charley's Strays donation jar on the counter. The women behind the counter thanked her; I thanked her and said I was Charley's cat person. The young woman smiled broadly and asked if she could buy a bag of cat food for us. I gestured to the food I'd put on the counter, and she made a second generous donation to help pay for it. Then one of the women behind the counter gave both of us free samples of dry cat food.

We also got cat food from Pepper Charles and from Shirley and coupons from our anonymous donor (she [or maybe he] used another of the envelopes with cats on them), Iris Martinello, Teresa Parent and Al Smith. I used \$4.50 worth of coupons on just one shopping trip.

I hope all of you and your human families, your pets and your veterinarians are being careful and keeping well. The man who prepares my taxes (another cat rescuer) obviously believes this pandemic will end; when I signed forms today he gave me my appointment card for March 2021.

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
